

The Pupil Premium.

What is it?

The Pupil Premium was introduced by the coalition government in 2011 to increase social mobility and reduce the gap in performance between pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds and their peers. Schools receive funding for each disadvantaged pupil and can use the funding flexibly, in the best interests of eligible pupils.

Who is eligible?

Children can be eligible due to the following reasons:

- Any pupil eligible for free school meals or if they have been in the last 6 years.
- Looked after children.
- Children that have been adopted from care or who have left care.
- Any child that has a parent (s) serving in the armed forces.

How much will Ark Chamberlain receive?

For the academic year 2015-16 the total figure is 394,680.

At January census, there were 299 children eligible (596 on roll) 50.2%
National average is 26.5%.

All of our eligible children fall into the category of FSM or Ever6 FSM and each child attracts 1320.

How will it be spent?

After researching how other schools have spent theirs and looking at the impact it has had, tracking back how Oldknow academy spent theirs historically and reading research such as

We decided and prioritised the following:

Item	Cost	Reason/link to Academy improvement plan.	Outcome and impact.
HLTA to support EAL children	£17,000	Newly arrived children to the academy to receive a planned induction programme and additional support. Aip 2.6	
Staff training to support EAL children and resources.	£5000	Staff training to improve knowledge of staff for pupils with EAL. Aip 2.6	
2 Parent support advisors	£60,000	To work closely with parents and the community. Engage parents with academy life and lead parent sessions. To continue the drive to improve attendance and ensure any absences are checked on thoroughly.	
2 x Learning Mentors	£60,000	To continue to improve and monitor behaviour. Work with targeted individuals and their families. Training for them including mental health and restorative justice. Aip 3.1	
Breakfast club	£9000	Funding for breakfast club for children to attend. Covering staff and food. Giving children a smooth start to the day and encouraging improved attendance and punctuality.	
Extra teaching assistant support	£35,000	To run after school clubs for children who have no internet access at home. Also other interventions that have been highlighted. Aip 4.1 and 4.2	
Extra teaching staff	£90,000	Additional support in years 5 & 6 to support with interventions. Assistant Vice Principal from future leaders programme. Aip 4.1 and 4.2	
Maths Whizz	£21,000	A web based learning programme that children can access from home. It gives a maths age and flags up any gaps in understanding. Aip 4.1	
Lexia	£14,00	A web based learning programme that children can access from home. It gives a reading age and flags up any gaps in understanding. It also highlights interventions needed. Aip 4.1	
Laptops	£40,000	Support learning. With the introduction of Maths Whizz and Lexia this year, there is more need than ever for every child to have computer access each day.	
Enrichment	£20,000	Opportunities for children to access enrichment activities that they might otherwise not get. For example subsidising some of a trip for Y6 to see the ballet, Y3 bringing the curriculum to life visit from a Viking etc. Aip 3.3	
Staff training to raise the quality of teaching and learning.	£20,000	Staff training. Promoting an ethos of attainment for all. Setting ever higher aspirations. Guiding staff towards metacognition, including the work of Carol Dweck. Aip 1.2	
TA training to deliver interventions.	£3000	Train TAs to deliver interventions, provide feedback and monitor progress.	

How will it be monitored?

Each area that has been identified will be monitored by its' outcome and the impact that it has had. This will take place throughout the year and at the end of year. This will be done in a variety of ways, from pupil voice, pupil data to attendance and behaviour figures.

Sports Premium

What is it?

In March 2013 the government announced that it was to provide additional funding of £150 million per annum for academic years 2013 to 2014 and 2014 to 2015 to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools in England - The Primary PE & Sport Premium. This was extended to 2015-16.

Who is eligible?

Children that receive pupil premium are eligible.
Schools with 17+eligible pupils receive £8000 and an additional payment of £5 per pupil.

How much will Ark Chamberlain receive?

For the academic year 2015-16 the total figure is £10,980.

How will it be spent?
