



## New Building Handover

We are pleased to announce that this week we have moved one step further to moving in to our brand new building. On Tuesday we were told that the contractors have now officially completed the building and we were given a shiny new set of keys and full access.

Unfortunately it will be a further few weeks before we are fully moved in as we still have to organize the putting up of fire-proof doors and arrange for data cabling for IT purposes to be installed. However, we hope to make immediate use of one or two rooms and are planning to move one Year 6 class and all the Year 5 class in there after the Easter break.

The immediate positive benefits of having the building work completed is that we have been able to take down the fencing around the building site. This means that pupils no longer have to walk around the outside of our site to get from block to block. Instead they can simply go through the middle, which is much quicker and easier. In addition, we are pleased to announce that our reception gates will now be much simplified so that visitors are able to access reception straightforwardly after 08:00 each morning.

We allowed our Year 6 pupils into the new building today for the very first time to have a look around and there were many cries of excitement and admiration.

## Emergency Procedures

You may be aware that over the last week or so schools within the City and the Black Country area were evacuated due to a bomb threat which turned out to be a hoax. This follows a number of hoax calls that have led to school evacuations and closures in schools in the Black Country. **Please be assured that these calls were all hoaxes and there was no genuine bomb threat.** Such incidents are extremely rare, and it is important that we don't over-react, or spread panic, especially to our children!

However, it is wise to have emergency procedures in place. In the event of an incident such as the one that faced other schools, or any other incident when the safety of the children is threatened, we will be guided by the emergency services, and will work closely with them. In emergency situations, we will keep you updated as promptly and as often as we can, via the website, text messages and/or Twitter, depending on the facilities available to us. You can help us in two ways:

- 1) Keep this in perspective and don't spread any fear to your children. If you do hear a message that something is going on, please don't panic.
- 2) In the event of a 'lockdown', please do not come to the school or phone the school. This could put you or the children at further risk. We will keep you updated as best we can.

Remember that the risk is very, very small.
