Uniform update

Whilst most parents and pupils have been happy with the new academy uniform, we have had some feedback about allowing girls to wear both a pinafore dress/skirt and trousers. We like to be responsive to parent concerns and therefore have discussed this at our first local governing body meeting held this week. As a result we have now amended our uniform policy and can confirm the following:

- Girls may wear both a pinafore dress/skirt and trousers
- Skirts/pinafores need to be no longer than just above the knee
- Whilst trousers are allowed, leggings are not
- Girls who wish to wear a hajib during PE should wear a sports hajib for safety and hygiene reasons. Other head coverings will not be allowed in PE
- If a child is not in correct uniform then parents may be contacted and asked to bring in the correct uniform for them to change into

Dyslexia Awareness

Dyslexia Awareness Week runs from 5th-11th October 2015 and is an annual event that aims to not only raise awareness of dyslexia but also showcase the amazing achievements that people with dyslexia have made.

Most people know that dyslexia is a broad term for disorders that involve difficulty in learning to read or interpret words, letters and other symbols, but were you aware that 10% of the British population are dyslexic?

In fact, according to the British Dyslexia Association, 4% are classified as severely dyslexic but despite the statistics being so high, many people still do not fully understand how to support people with it, which is where Dyslexia Awareness Week comes in.

At Ark Chamberlain, we are working closely with 'Drive for literacy', a programme that supports teachers to make sure their classrooms and teaching are dyslexia friendly. A specialist dyslexia teacher will be in school on Thursday 8th October to talk to children about dyslexia and we will be organising staff training and individual support over the coming year.
